

Safety with Little Red Riding Hood: A Communication Tool for Everyday Situations

AAC Tool

Material needed:

- Communication board with pictures,
- cards with safety rules and emotions,
- picture cards from the story,
- AAC devices/apps, paper,

Key competence: daily life skills

GENERAL OBJECTIVES

This tool uses the fairy tale of Little Red Riding Hood to develop everyday life skills, with a focus on safety, independence, and emotional literacy. Children learn to recognise dangers, express feelings, and make appropriate decisions in daily situations. AAC tools enable children with communication difficulties to express themselves and participate, increasing their confidence and inclusion in the community.

HOW TO USE IT

The tool includes communication boards, safety cards, and emotion cards used in activities such as story discussions, role-playing, and problem-solving. Children respond to hypothetical situations (“What would you do?”), express feelings (“I’m scared,” “I’m happy”), and plan daily routines using symbols and sentence strips. The activities are designed to encourage both verbal and nonverbal communication, as well as the development of independence in everyday life situations.

HOW TO CREATE IT

Cards and communication boards can be created using applications like Boardmaker, Cboard, Pictoselector, or made manually using pictures, symbols, and colours. The boards should include key phrases related to safety (“I don’t talk to strangers,” “I call for help”), basic emotions (fear, happiness, confusion), daily activities, and characters from the fairy tale to help connect with the content of the activities.



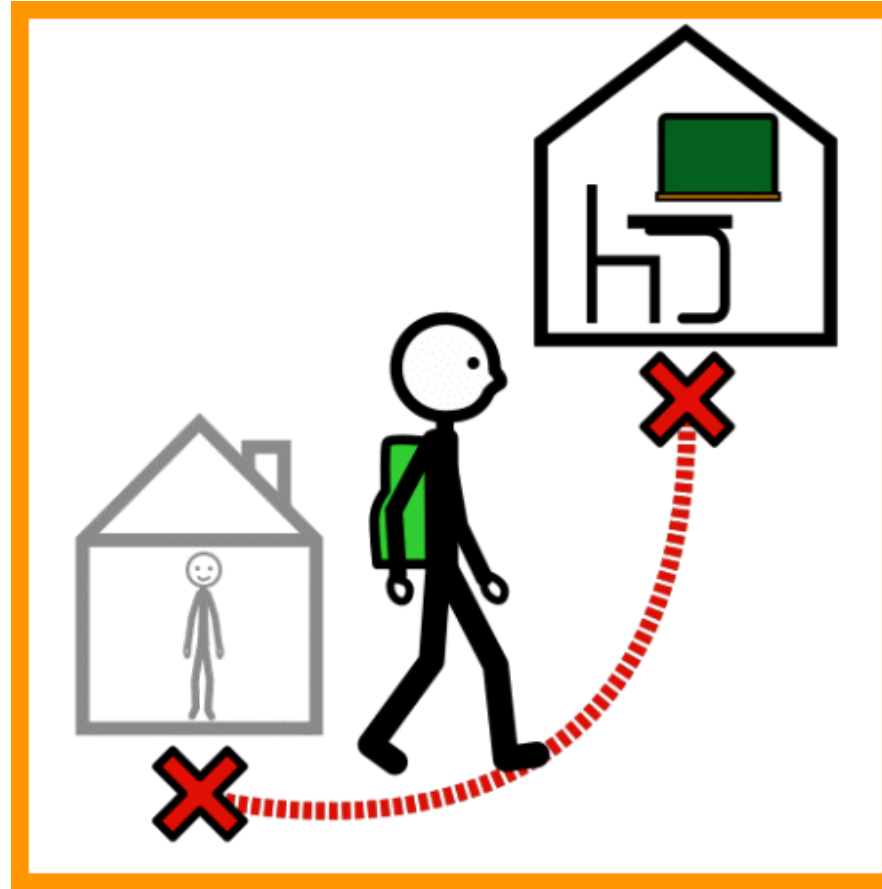

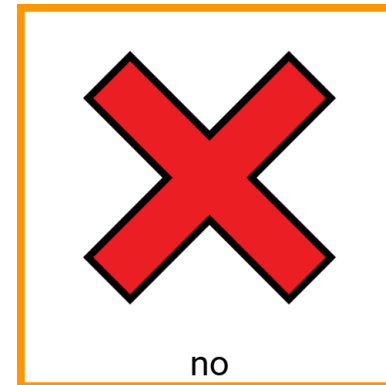
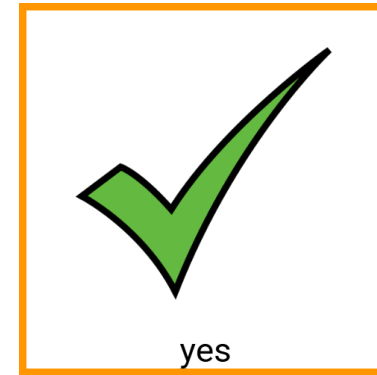
Do not share personal information to strangers.
