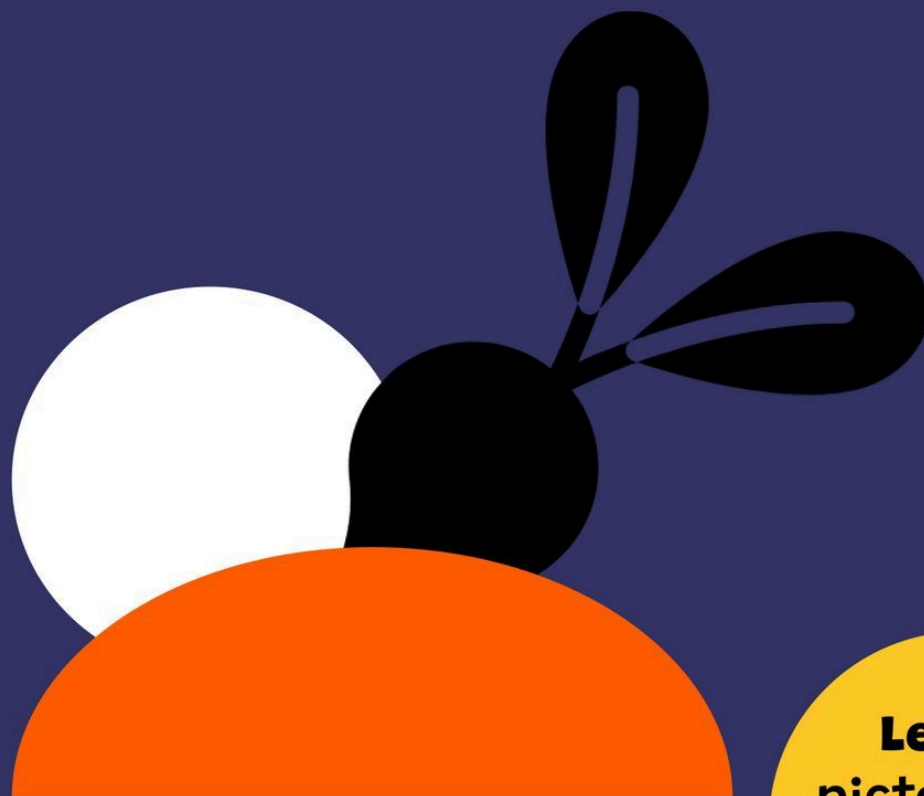

Pictograms enables greater inclusion of all the students.

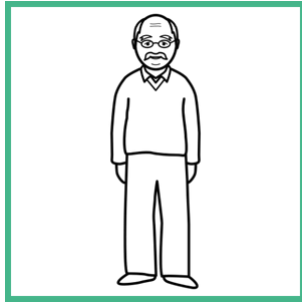
They also offer an alternative reading support to the text.

The level of the text has been adapted to ensure greater understanding.

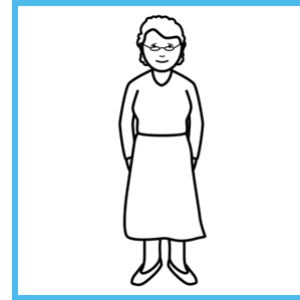
