Pictograms enables greater inclusion of all the students.

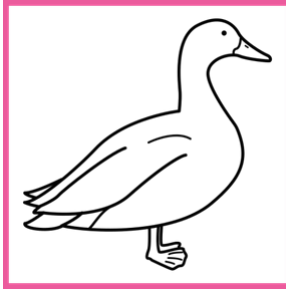
They also offer an alternative reading support to the text.

The level of the text has been adapted to ensure greater understanding.

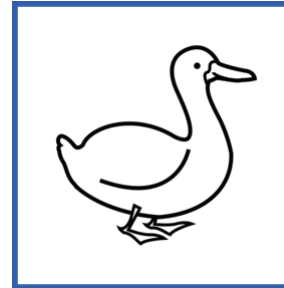
Most of the pictograms have been generated on arasaac.org.
